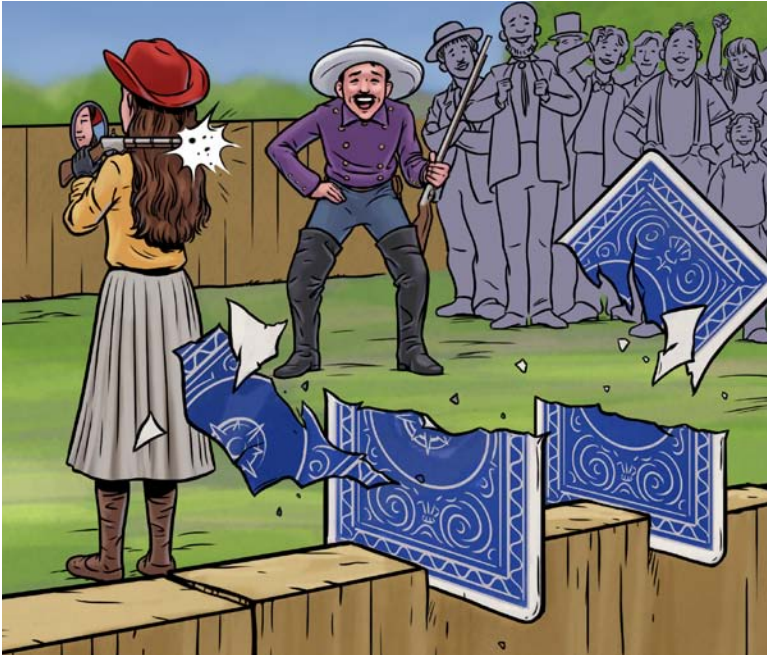
“Shooting cards,” Annie said proudly.

Sitting Bull was so impressed that he adopted Annie as his daughter and named her Little Sure Shot.

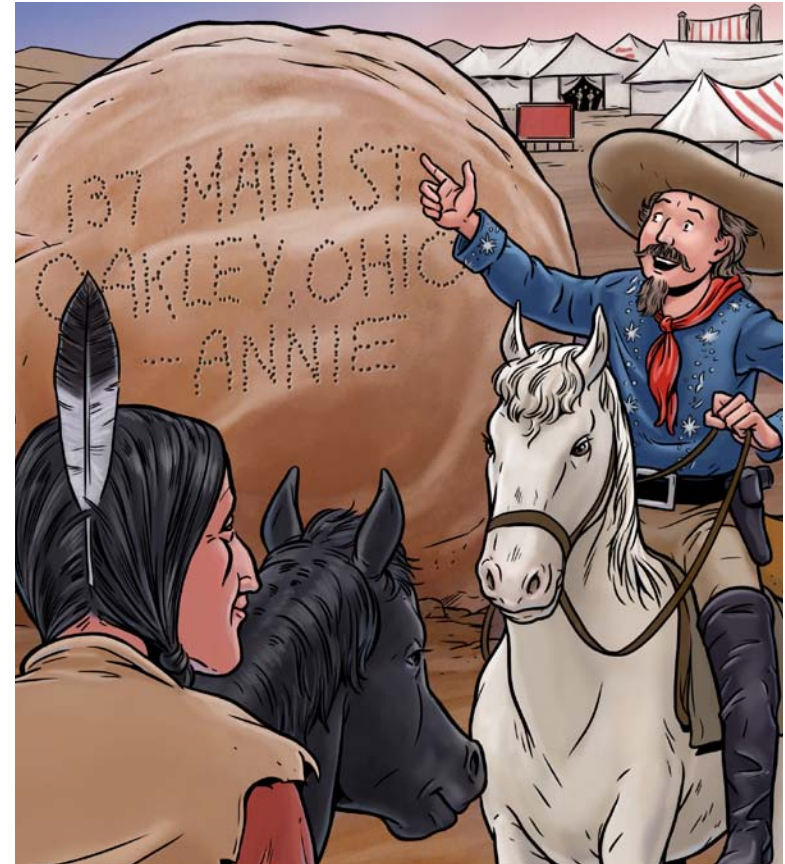


Buffalo Bill nodded and said, “What else have you got?”

<b>sharpshooter</b> ( <i>n.</i> )	a person who is very skilled and accurate when shooting at a target (p. 6)
<b>tale</b> ( <i>n.</i> )	a true or fictional story, especially one told in an imaginative way (p. 15)
<b>talent</b> ( <i>n.</i> )	a natural ability or skill (p. 11)
